Dear Parents

Welcome to October! It was so great to meet many of you at the Open House. This month we are continuing to get students familiar with some technology, specifically, *Prodigy, Typing.com* and *Google Classroom*. Also this month, students in Grade 4 and 7 will be doing the provincial Foundation Skills Assessment (FSAs).

FSAs – We will be writing the provincial *Foundation Skills Assessment* tests in October and November. These tests do not count for report card grades, but they do take a significant amount of class time to administer. They test reading comprehension, writing and numeracy. Students will complete handwritten and online components. Parents will be mailed results sometime in the spring. In class, we do the sample practice tests so they are familiar with the process and can maneuver the online portion comfortably.

KEYBOARDING – In computer class, students have been set up with *Typing.com* accounts. We will also be practicing keyboarding skills in class regularly for the first two terms. Like anything, consistent

practice will help students learn this practical skill. This can also be something students can practice at home (if they have access to a computer), especially when they have no other homework tasks to complete.

GOOGLE CLASSROOM — I have also set up a Grade 4 Google Classroom. We will use Google Classroom *in class* to complete certain tasks. It is mainly for student use, and our goal is that they can use it to complete tasks at school (e.g. watch a video, complete an assignment). Parents of course can sign-in to their child's account and see what they have worked on.

PRODIGY – I have set students up with a math gaming account called *Prodigy*. Previous students have enjoyed it, and I like that I can align questions to whatever we are doing in class (number sense, fractions, geometry, compound sentences etc.). We will use it in class for all students at times, but usually, it is used as an optional activity for students who are all caught up on assignments. They *can* access it at home and you can have a *parent account* if you choose. For students who enjoy the game it may give them some benefits and encourage them to do math or literacy in their leisure time.
